### **DISTRICT HIGHLIGHTS**

1. **BARNEGAT HIGH SCHOOL NAMES BLOUSTEIN SCHOLARS**

Barnegat High School has named nine students as Edward J. Bloustein Distinguished Scholars. ## **PRESENTATIONS/AWARDS**

Mr. Houser: We are going to start off with the STAR Awards and Outstanding Student Awards. Dr. McMahan?

Dr. McMahan: Thank you, everybody. Can everybody hear me? Mr. Rivers, can you hear me? Excellent.

Before I start my presentations I would like to say that for all of you who have attended these meetings over the years the Barnegat Township School system is very proud of the fact that when we hire people here, or people work here or if you are a member of the community like Mr. Rivers and the VFW, everybody deeply cares about everybody in the community. I would just like you to know that today we had a memorial service for one of our teachers at the Brackman School. Is Mr. Nichol here? Marilyn Ferguson, one of our teachers, who I cannot speak highly enough about, passed away a number of weeks ago. I think she battled cancer I think it was seven or eight years. Outstanding woman, who cared for children beyond belief and had the strength of somebody that I would love to emulate. She was an outstanding individual, so if we could just take a couple seconds for a moment of silence for Marilyn Ferguson.

I thank you for that and I know that Marilyn's soul is with us here today and I think the awards I am going to give out tonight exemplifies a lot of how Marilyn felt about the district and our children.

## **STAR AWARDS AND OUTSTANDING STUDENT AWARDS**

Each and every month any member of the school district can give out an award to a student for doing something exemplary for someone in the district and that is what she embodied in everything she did. She was a wonderful individual. Those awards are then put into a box and each month we pick out a winner who receives a bicycle on behalf of the district.

The first child that I am going to award tonight is an outstanding student from the Horbelt School. This student showed compassion for other people. In March while the Horbelt School collected pennies for students from Pennies for Patients Drive to benefit people with leukemia and lymphoma, this person donated, and first grade, an outstanding \$94.03 to the cause. We commend this child on their kindness, is Mr. Kiewe with us? Scott could you come up too and help me give this out? We congratulate this student for being an outstanding person, and outstanding student and a member of this community, please welcome Tristan Percelli.

Tristan that is wonderful, congratulations, you are a nice boy. Do you have anything to say to the crowd?

Our second award winner is a student at the Collins School. This student demonstrated exceptional kindness in the month of April. A girl at the Collins School was using a walker to get around the building because of her disability and upon seeing her, this child immediately offered to help her carry her lunch as well as accompanying her down the hallways to make sure she would not have to walk by herself. I think that is an outstanding show of compassion for other people; and I think that is something that everyone should emulate and I would like to give this award to Collins School student, Mr. Delaporte could you come up here and help me out, to Anthony Russo from the Collins School for the April Star Award winner. Anthony, congratulations, nice job. Do you want to say something to the crowd? Anthony does not want to say something to the crowd, excellent Anthony, thanks, thanks very much. We have to get a picture of Mr. Delaporte.

Last but not least, our final award winner is a student from the Dunfee School, is Mrs. Makela here this evening, Kathy come on up. This student showed tremendous integrity during the month of May. During recess this student found a \$10.00 bill on the ground on the playground and while many others may have tried to pocket the money, this child immediately turned it into the office so the person who lost it could get it back. ## **MUSICIANS SHINE AT MUSIC IN THE PARKS FESTIVAL**

Mr. Houser: The musicians at the Brackman Middle School and Barnegat High School stole the show at the *Music in the Parks* festival held at Six Flags Great Adventure this month. We congratulate all of these fine musicians for the following achievements and invite the Directors to please share a few words about the performances.

Winning for the district are: the Brackman Jazz Ensemble who took first place, Class AA and Best Overall; C.J. Pacquing, who won Outstanding Soloist from over 1,100 other participants; the Brackman Vocal Ensemble who took first place, Class AA; the Barnegat High School concert band who took first place, Class AA; and the BHS Vocal Ensemble who took second place, Class AA. We would like to welcome the directors of these music ensembles. We congratulate all of these fine musicians for the following achievements, and invite their directors to please share a few words about their performances.

Dr. McMahon: Come on guys. How many people are here from the Music in the Parks awards, getting some awards this evening? OK, what to say a couple of words there? We are asking Mr. Constantine to say a couple of words.

Mr. Constantine: I just want to say it is a great and wonderful opportunity and experience to be able to take the band to a new level, meaning, going out to festivals and competitions. Actually I don't know if you remember Dr. McMahon, it was Dr. McMahon that implemented and started the Music in the Parks program. He supported us going way back to 2002, and the Board of Education then all the way through the present Board of Education supports the program and supports the kids going out to achieve this kind of recognition making us better musicians and being more educated that is what it is all about. And, of course, Steve Nichol and Karen McKeon back then supported it and let us keep going, so I can't thank you all enough and the kids have benefited greatly from this experience. Our Jazz Band got best overall and they pulled the highest scores I have ever seen in any kind of festival or competition. Mr. Orrechio: When I first came into the district three years ago Mr. Constantine and Ms. Bense had told me about this Music in the Parks and the wonderful opportunity it afforded our students at Barnegat. So I said well, maybe I will try that and I went to the Administration here at the high school, Dr. Saxton, and last year was our first year that we participated and we went and had a great time. The kids learn a lot but when they see they have something to work for, something like an award like this or a day at the park they really kick it up a notch when they play. Last year they improved immensely in the year they were with me. This year we again went back and the concert band took first place. We had our highest score ever and we fell just shy of the top rating, Superior. I could not be more proud of all the students for all the hard work they did and again, I want to thank all my principals, even the elementary principals because I was actually able to miss a day from them because I teach at all the districts. So thank you to all the Principals, Ms. Makela, Mr. Kiewe, Mr. Delaporte and to Dr. Saxton for giving us the opportunity to go and to succeed as well as we did.

Ms. Bense: I have had the opportunity and the pleasure to accompany Mr. Constantine with the Jazz Band in Music in the Parks and I also take out my Vocal Ensemble. We love singing for the community, we go out all the time to the Rec Center for SOCH Benefit and other various places

we like to go, but to go for a festival for just them, themselves, is a big thrill for them. It is something they really strive to work for. It is a level of achievement that they really want to do and I again this year we got first place. So again thank you for giving us the opportunity.

Dr. McMahon: I am going to give out these awards for participation to first of all Mrs. Bense for the Brackman Vocal Ensemble, for Mr. Orrechio for the Barnegat High School Concert Band, and, last, but certainly not least for the Brackman Jazz Ensemble, Mr. Frank Constantine. There is a special student that won a special award, I don't know if the person is here this evening for Frank to give a couple of words about the child?

Mr. Constantine: I don't know if C.J. Pacquing is here tonight. OK, if he is it would be great for him to come up here. Real quick, C.J. Pacquing, eighth grader, was chosen over 1,100 students at the Festival, he received one of four medals of outstanding solo performance. When I say 1,100 kids, I don't mean middle school, it is anywhere from elementary through high school and the adjudicators of that day recognized him in that group of 1,100 kids as receiving an award. I can't wait to present C.J. with this in school. Thanks.

Dr. McMahon: Thank you, Mr. Constantine that is quite an honor and also the Barnegat High School Vocal Ensemble, I know that the Director could not be here this evening, I am going to give that to Mrs. Bense. I am going to ask Mr. Nichol along with the other people to take these wonder trophies and place them in the trophy case of the new entrance of the Barnegat Brackman Middle School. Mr. Constantine do you want to take one, you are not going to drop it are you Frank? Mr. Orrechio? Alright, we congratulate them for an outstanding job in terms of that. Thank you everybody.

Mr. Houser: All those in favor? Say Aye.

All: Aye.

Mr. Houser: All those opposed? Motion carried.

Mr. Houser: Before we move on to make the motion on public session I would like to comment on a couple of issues raised by the public during public session previously. What we said we were going to do was to answer some of the questions put out there. If we could not answer them at the meeting, we would follow up at the next meeting.

With regard to the voting of the three districts in the high school, I happen to vote at the high school for the primaries and concur that having three districts voting in one location in close quarters will result in delays in voting and possible electioneering, especially when we are talking about November's election for President of the United States, a U.S. Senator, a U.S. Congressman as well as local elections. I requested that the County Clerk and the Board of Elections review this issue and suggested that the three districts be separated to three separate schools or if we need to go outside of the schools, whatever is necessary to separate the districts.

In regard to the budget, the Board of Education has put on the school website the entire up-to-date budget for the public to review and print out. We know there was some concern in prior meetings in public session about the budget not being available. It is available and right now the up-to-date budget, and for the 2009-2010 school budget we also have the budget on the school website so that you will not have the same issue with the public and you will be able to have copies of the budget in the future. You will have the budget before you are voting on it and it will be on the website for the coming year.

In regard to working with the public, the Board is requesting that the Administration put on the school website the complete school policy manual. This will take some time to develop, but we will be working with the policy company to make this happen. Also, tonight the Board will be

voting on a Motion that will allow the Administration and the Board to have full access to the policy company's website to review all policies and immediately have access to the current Board policies in case an Administrator needed the policy immediately for a school issue. We think this is very important and this is really modern technology and it will really improve the school system for us.

In regard to any supposed claimed vendetta in regard to a budget cut of \$500,000, the Committees for the Board of Education and the Township Committee looked at the issues raised by the public. It was a clear case of making a clear fiscal decision on all fourteen items that we were cutting that concerned, you, the public. In regard to the supposed possible \$3.2 million that was thrown out by the people, apparently they are not really concerned with affecting the quality of education of the children. That number was raised in regard to the cost of busing in the summer camps. That is what the state says is the issues and of course you all know what we did, we voted to keep the summer camps by charging a nominal fee.

In regard to cutting any busing, we as a Board realized that we could not cut bussing without first making sure that all the students were safe. This was an issue brought up in shared services during the budget by the Township, but again we wanted to make sure the children would be safe. So, we have had discussions with the Shared Services Committee, the Board of Education and the Township and we will be having a discussion as a Board of Education on having a study done on busing. So, any statements made by anyone about cutting the \$3 million from budget or making any additional budget cuts is only being done for political purposes, they are not for the betterment of the children. Any additional cuts would have affected the quality of education of our students. We, as a Board, clearly stated that we would not cut anything that would have negatively affected the quality of education for students and we stuck to that statement.

In the next few months we will be setting up a Public Representation Committee to meet with the public and get your input on issues regarding the school district and what we can do collectively to make our school district the best that it can be.

In accordance with Board of Education policy, each participant must be recognized by the preceding officer and must preface their comments by an announcement of their name, address and group affiliation if appropriate. Your anticipated courtesy to the members of the public and the Board is appreciated.

May I have a Motion to open the meeting to public comment?

Mr. Falkowski: First by Mrs. Sarno and Second by Mrs. Becker. All in favor, aye. None opposed.

Mr. Houser: Motion carried.

## **PUBLIC SESSION**

Mr. Houser: Mr. Laufgas

Mr. Bernard Laufgas: Mr. Houser, Mrs. Becker, Members of the Board last week...

Mr. Houser: Mr. Laufgas, can you state your name and address please.

Mr. Bernard Laufgas: Bernard Laufgas, Schooner Avenue, I am sorry. Last week at the Wawa where our group meets, the President was there and he asked me, he said the Board wants to discuss with me to settle all litigation. Am I correct?

Mr. Houser: Well, that would be dealt with through the attorney, but yes, the Board would like to settle all litigation.

Mr. Laufgas: For your information, your attorney cannot have any involvement in any litigation with me; his law firm represented me in the 1970s, so he is out of luck. Look for lawyer, Number 2. I believe Steve Secare is your conflict lawyer, is that true?

Mr. Houser: That is correct.

Mr. Laufgas: Well look for lawyer Number 3, I filed a suit against him, so I don't know how you guys are going to do it, but figure something out. On the suit that I filed against the School Board, it was on the public record on the 47<sup>th</sup> NJ Statute 47-1A that is filed. The Board did not give me public records that I have been asking for since January and they did not fax it to me. The Statute says you have to fax it, I think you should advise the public that when they ask for public records, this way they don't have to pay for documents. If you want the case, Atlantic City case, the Superintendent of the Great Egg Harbor School District did not want to give the Agenda to the lawyer, I mean to the reporter, of the Atlantic City Press, mistake #1. I believe it cost them over \$50,000 in attorney fees, I think it is 2002. So I think when somebody asks for public records you ought to tell them. It is your obligation to tell them and there is no reason to charge because when you fax documents, you don't fax them the documents, you fax them the information and you cannot charge for the information. So, here is a bit of information.

Now on the civil suit that I filed, I have asked for public records which I was denied, Brian did not give them to me. He says, "I am waiting for the Board to approve it." Well, the Board approved that policy long ago after January 22 and he did not fax it to me. So that is a violation of OPRA. The penalty is \$1,000, it what the legislature put in there. I asked for the Board to change their policy, Policy #0167, specifically the word "relevant". This is a public meeting, what has relevance have to do if somebody comes up here and he speaks, while you might not like what they say, you have to listen to him. It has nothing to do with relevance; it has to do with the public complaining. Once a month, you guys have a meeting and you have to listen to their complaining. What you do with that is another matter. Township Committee has twice a month, so twice a month we can nail them and once a month we can nail the Board. And, I helped fight for you to get elected and I don't regret it. I also want that the policy should be changed, if you are going to decide to hold the public to five minutes, you should have a large

clock there. Let the public see, not your Board Secretary keeping a little clock and he decides when your five minutes are up. If you are going to let the public speak, let them speak. If you are holding to five minutes, let them have the full five minutes, let them see, you should have a clock there.

The flyer that I sent the Board, which I would like to start a 501 3C and the Board, the past Board, those invalids I will call them, some of them were left over on this Board, they simply ignored me. Well, I will look for excuse to sue, maybe you like it, the easy way, listen to the public, you have flyers that you permit to send to the kids. They should have nothing to do with politics; you did it in this election, not this Board, except the members up there now except for Mrs. Mitchell and for the other one. You should not give kids the drug dealers call them mules, you just simply give the teachers to give to the students, that is wrong, don't do that. If you do it, you will find yourself in another lawsuit, and in the 80s I sue the Board for that.

Now, on Number 2, I will come back with Mr. Cox.

Mr. Houser: Well, Mr. Laufgas your five minutes is almost up and what I would really suggest you do is participate on the Public Representation Committee we are going to be having. We can have a discussion about a lot of these items. We do want your input and we will look at policies, we will work with, but I would like to see you do this through the Public Representation Committee if that is ok with you.

Mr. Laufgas: No, I am representing myself, not the public.

Mr. Houser: No, no, but the Committee is going to be called that and it is to deal with a lot of the public issues and the suggestions you have, they want your input and you are part of the public and we do want your input.

Mr. Laufgas: When do you guys want to sit down about this lawsuit? Because I am ready to type interrogatories, I am sure your lawyer knows all about interrogatories.

Mr. Montenegro: The Tort Claim Notice that you are referencing...

Mr. Laufgas: Oh no, not the Tort Claim, the suit that I filed that is under the OPRA.

Mr. Montenegro: Why don't I reach out to you and we will sit down sometime later this week or next week and we will talk about the issues that you have raised in that lawsuit. Of course, first I will look into the issue if there is a conflict or not related to, I am not familiar with the 1970s. I will state on the record that I was not a lawyer in the 1970s.

Mr. Laufgas: We both spent \$250,000 on this, don't worry about this. We are trying to avoid.

Mr. Houser: OK, and if need be if you would prefer me to be there, I can be there as well.

Mr. Laufgas: Now the other thing I suggested awhile ago, the School Board should get a huge marquis, let the people in this town know that this past week a young lady won actually she won

the pole vault state championship. She finished second because of a miss. Now who knows about this, nobody, huh?

Voice: I do.

Mr. Laufgas: OK, but you did not say anything. OK, my next one is, now I spoke to the Board for the past two years and I asked to change the name of the Horbelt School. Mrs. Mitchell did her song and dance in Jewish and they think you didn't do nothing. I am asking you, again, you should change the name. Horbelt stole from the people, the Prosecutor's office....

Mrs. Mitchell: Mr. Houser, I ask that Mr. Montenegro address this, Mr. Horbelt is not here to defend himself.

Mr. Laufgas: What difference does it make if he is here or not?

Mr. Houser: What I would suggest, again, Mr. Laufgas is we do this through the Public Representation Committee because a lot of these things are suggestions and a lot of the stuff, what we need to do is meet with the Committee, make recommendations, the Committee can go back and if there is any legal issues we can check them out and get back to you on. It is better if we do it through the Committee because the Committee can meet any time in the middle of the month or anytime we see fit, so we are better off if we do this through a Committee structure.

Mr. Laufgas: Let me ask you, what does that have to do with legal, changing the school? What does that have to do with legal, the man stole from the people, he had his wife's vehicles repaired by the school, he had over 5,000 gallons of gas pumped into his private car. Prosecutor told the Board not to prosecute him because the Chief of Detectives and him went to school together.

Mr. Houser: OK, there is no sense arguing over the issue, Mr. Laufgas, what we are going to do is bring it to the Public Representation Committee, but we need to get a legal review on this because you can talk to Tom Monahan previously and he suggested it was a legal issue for this Board. I was part of that when he made the statement and that is why the Board could not move forward on it. So, I again would suggest through the Committee that we get a legal opinion on this before we can move forward on any suggestion like that.

Mr. Laufgas: Now is the Board going to make copies from your archives about the Prosecutor investigation and the School Board Attorney, Mr. Pardes drafting up the charges against him?

Mr. Houser: That could be all done through the Committee who can submit it to the attorney.

Mr. Laufgas: But you want to talk about it?

Mr. Houser: The Committee will, yes.

Mr. Laufgas: Yes. now the other thing.

Mr. Houser: You have got to wrap up because we are way, way over; we are like ten minutes here.

Mr. Laufgas: That is why we need a clock up there. The last thing, as far as Mr. Cox, I came over here to settle, but I was going to settle with you guys, an apology from him for stealing my pizza and \$1,000 but that is off the table because I am filing a suit against him and I am going to his neighborhood and everyone of his neighbors is going to get a letter.

Mr. Houser: You can't be talking about an employee and we need to move on, Mr. Laufgas.

Mr. Laufgas: OK, well, you have a nice day.

Mr. Houser: You too.

Ms. Jackie Ferrara, 62 Water Street: I want to say congratulations to the new Board members and for your new positions and everything. I am here to recognize some children in our band program, Amy Maloney, Matt Fitzmaurice, Jacquelyn Ferrara and David Ferrara are representing Barnegat High School and they are playing in a band that is going overseas to Germany this year. Last year, Jackie also went with this band to Italy. Mr. Gagnon nominates two children in his class due to his professor from a college and that is how they are going. They are representing our school and our country and they also play our patriotic music over in these other countries.

Also, my daughter was Barnegat High School's first foreign exchange student and then we had Francesco and Yanico come to the school. Well, the organization picked Jackie to her testimony for their organization to go global that went to every home that was involved in AFS for her experience and they acknowledged Madam Morris in this letter and they acknowledge all three exchange students that have come to my home and Barnegat High School. So I just wanted the Board to know that our school was acknowledged globally and the experiences they got from Jackie when they wrote this letter were very good experiences and how teenagers like Great Adventure and things like that. I just wanted the Board to know that Madam Morris in our life, she has changed my family's life by nominating Jackie, Jackie going overseas and then when Mr. Gagon nominated Jackie again for music to go overseas, it was a lot easier to let her go, but not only my family but I feel this high school was blessed the year that Yanic and Francesco entered our school because it affected a lot of children in this school. My family is still in contact with them and my children are going to be visiting them while they are over here and if anybody comes to the Board or the Principal I am involved with AFS trying to find homes for other students. That is it.

Mr. Houser: Thank you, and if you wouldn't mind, if you could give us a copy of what you have at the Board office, and also any other information you have regarding needing homes for other students and things like that.

Mr. Ferrara: This letter that they used, Jackie's testimony, is a fund raiser that went out, I did not want to read it because I did not want anybody to think I am fund raising for the school, but I just wanted Jackie to be acknowledged that her testimony went global and her school is represented in that. I will give you copies and I have copies of the children who need homes.

Dr. McMahon: Dr. Saxton if you could take that I think that would be great to use at the front office and stuff, Mr. Cox, thanks a lot.

Mr. Houser: We have someone way in the back?

Ms. Kim Hochran, 3 Tulip Court: I noticed that so far the redistricting has not made it to your agenda and I am wondering exactly how and when notification will be made to parents and if there are any plans to open the new school for a walk through for the children and their parents before the first day of school?

Mr. Houser: Dr. McMahon can you respond to that?

Dr. McMahon: Well, I know there is a Board Committee dealing with, I think Mrs. Sarno is on that Committee?

Mrs. Sarno: We have met three times so far. We do have a few different plans in place and what we are trying to look on is what was going to be the safest way for the kids to get to school and also we are trying to look at the whole picture, do you want to disrupt every school for the redistricting or do you want to just take one school? The other plan is well, some kids can go out their front door and see a school, but they are not being bused to that school, so there are three different ways that we are looking at and we are trying to see which way would be the most beneficial to the students long-term.

Ms. Kim Hochran: Do you have a timeline for this decision to be made so that the parents can be notified? This is going to affect a lot of people's lives.

Mrs. Sarno: I believe we are going to have it done for the July meeting, is that correct Mr. Delaporte, we are going to work on that? Yes, July 8 meeting.

Ms. Kim Hochran: And that will be the final decision at the July meeting?

Mrs. Sarno: I believe it will be able to come to a conclusion, an agreement by then.

Ms. Kim Hochran: OK, so you will have different neighborhoods picked out, is that the way you plan on notifying parents of this decision?

Mrs. Sarno: What we have right now is we have maps and we go through with our highlighters and we currently have the schools broken up with certain colors and then we say, ok, well, right now Horbelt is, these people are going to Horbelt, these people are supposed to be going to Ocean Acres, these people are going to Collins. We have it broken down to how many kids were in each school. We do have one school that is actually above its capacity so we do need to take a lot of kids out of that one school. That is the main school the kids are coming from, but then where do we get the rest of the kids from? Do we want to take them from other schools and disrupt those, the consistency that those kids have right now? And if we do that then we might be filling up the new school, do we want to leave some space in the new school for admissions

that might come in the future? So there is different things we have to look at so that is what we are looking at. We have been going around and around and we really have not come to an agreement yet. So, we are still working on that and we are going back to transportation also to find out transportation-wise what is going to be the best.

Ms. Hochran: Is your Committee's recommendation the final say on this?

Mr. Houser: No, let me just step in. We were planning on having a meeting, originally in July we do not have Board meetings. We have already called for a special meeting for July 8 and one of the reasons is because redistricting is very important to the Board so no, that is not the final decision, it does have to come back. Any vote in Committee is not legally binding it has to come in front of the entire Board. So, working Committees, what usually happens is the Committee, working with the administration, comes up with a solution, a recommendation, and therefore then the recommendation has to be passed on to the entire Board.

Ms. Hochran: When does the Board plan on voting on that?

Mr. Houser: We are hoping to vote July 8.

Ms. Hochran: Planning on voting July 8, ok, and then parent notifications will be made?

Mr. Houser: Dr. McMahon, can you answer the question she has asked? You asked the question on walk-throughs and to be honest with you notifying the parents is not done by the Board; it is done by administration so I will defer that question.

Mrs. Sarno: We have not done a walk-through ourselves either.

Ms. Hochran: I would hope the Board is taking into consideration the concerns of the parents and the community. There are a lot of parents that work full time and take their kids to sitters to get them to school. If they are going to break up, and I realize schools have to be broken up for this, it is not going to be easy on anyone, but the sooner the parents get word of what school their child is going to be going to, the sooner they can make their child make that adjustment and the sooner they can provide the daycare or before or after care that their child is going to need.

Mrs. Sarno: I completely understand and the majority, we all have children here who are all in the schools, so.

Ms. Hochran: Thank you, so July 8.

Mr. Houser: How about the walk-through, Dr. McMahon is there any plans to have?

Dr. McMahon: We have to wait for the final CO from SDA. It is the State's building now so we can't even do a work-through date until we know until we are actually going to take ownership.

Mr. Houser: OK.

Robert Everett, Arlington Avenue, Bayville: Good evening folks, I am the President of Berkeley Little League. I have come here tonight to make this statement about an incident.

Mr. Houser: Sir could I ask you to hold on one minute please, I am going to refer to the Board's attorney.

Mr. Montenegro: Mr. Everett, we spoke on the phone and I am familiar with the incident you are about to comment on.

Mr. Everett: Yes we did.

Mr. Montenegro: I just wanted to advise the Board that since our last discussion last week I received in the mail from the district a Notice of Tort Claim that was filed on behalf of a student from Central Regional related to this incident indicating an intent to sue the Barnegat Township School District for compensatory damages in the estimated amount of \$500,000. Based on the receipt of that Notice of Tort Claim, as we always do, that has been forwarded to the insurance carrier for their review and investigation. Because that is an anticipated litigation matter my recommendation to the Board is that it be allowed to go to the insurance company to do their investigation and do what they do and that there should not be comment regarding the incident from the Board while that investigation is present. My further understanding is that police have initially investigated the matter and based on that investigation there are no charges that were filed or pending and this district cooperated with that investigation and that matter as far as we know was resolved. But because of the filed Tort Claim Notice my recommendation is that there should be no comment from the Board regarding the incident. Mr. Everett is free to comment on the incident, I would only just remind, you are probably not familiar with this Board's policy but it is probably similar to Central's policy, as it relates to incidents regarding pupils, that individuals not be named in public for their own privacy reasons.

Mr. Everett: Yes, I understand that so and I realize from conversations we had and a conversation with your Athletic Director that apparently something that I was not aware of happened, but I still feel that I need to make a statement tonight and I will not name names if you will.

With that I do appreciate your giving me the opportunity to speak and I realize you may not like what I you have to say here, but I did feel strongly enough about this that I did have to come down here tonight along with some other concerned parents to make sure the Board understood fully how concerned we were about what happened in this particular incident. I would say this incident could have happened in really a lot of schools and that is something that really concerns me. You see a lot of this type of stuff that can very easily get out of hand at other sporting events and after-school activities and I don't know why people accept them. I really don't understand that and I feel your Board had an opportunity here to do something about this and to be frank with you, I don't think you have done anything about it.

What I was talking about was we hosted at our little league complex, a varsity baseball game between Central Regional and Barnegat. I would hope that you are all familiar with the incident. To summarize it quickly, a Central player was seriously injured by a violent collision with a

Barnegat player after the final out. The Central player suffered a broken tooth, serious concussion and a ruptured spleen. He spent five days in the intensive care unit of a hospital. This is from a baseball game, not a car accident, five days in the intensive care unit. We express great disappointment in your response to the incident or I should say a lack of response. If only because of the seriousness of the injuries it is demanded that your full and immediate attention be brought to this incident to try and get to the bottom of it. It was only after four weeks and consistent prodding from a lot of our parents, I know you got a lot of phone calls down here, that anything started; your Board seemed to give this some attention. That is when I finally started getting some phone calls back not from the people that I called, but from the attorney and eventually from your Athletic Director.

I do not understand how you can take no action when a student ended up in the intensive care unit for five days. This was a baseball game. Once you had a chance to review the evidence which our parents had to collect, I realize maybe it was not super conclusive, but certainly enough I think to at least give you pause and try and figure out what happened here considering the injuries. When you combine that with questions as to the student's intent and any reasonable person would have questions as far as the student's intent goes, still nothing. You missed an opportunity to do the right thing and perhaps more importantly, at least to our knowledge certainly to this date, what are you going to do to make sure this never happens again? And, again, I will say not just here it should be in any school, this should have never happened and I see no one trying to correct this. I would say the criticisms just have not been lodged here, we have lodged it at our own school board. We are very disappointed in the overall response to this.

Undoubtedly, I guess the attorney already talked about some of this, you are going to talk about police investigations and lawsuits. I didn't file a lawsuit; I am not pushing to have anyone arrested or locked up that is not my intention. I think the attorney can relay that to you, we had a pretty good conversation on the phone I felt. I think they are very weak arguments; the situation could have been properly and prudently addressed very quickly. You can have done it in a matter of days, you could have sent the right message to everyone involved and we probably would not be here tonight. All I can say is that it is extremely disappointing not just to me but to everyone else who has been watching this as well. Thank you.

Mr. Houser: Thank you. Mr. Checcia?

Phil Checcia, 12 Windward Drive: I just heard about this, it is a lawsuit against Barnegat for having another school play baseball on our property and this child got hurt?

Mr. Montenegro: No, first of all

Mr. Checcia: They are filing lawsuits against us, for what? A ruptured spleen, I can't see how you get one at a baseball game unless somebody hits you with a bat so why is this frivolous lawsuit even taking place, I wouldn't even discuss it with this guy. Tell him to talk to the lawyers.

Just this week, there was an article and I don't know if it was one of the townships in Berkeley, their Board of Education, signed a deal with Apple. Now this was a plan that I had years ago

when I ran one that Splendorio was going to pick up on. You would have had a computer on every desk with these kids. They signed with Apple and I think they gave them 248 computers. That would give you the books that would have kids with helmets on it, encyclopedias and all the necessary properties for these kids to learn. But besides that there is about 248 Apple computers involved free of charge. Once you get these on the books and see how that works, Microsoft wanted to do the same thing and when Splendorio took that over he was at HP and it all fell through because someone said the person who they were going to talk to left. Well as all of us know when you work for a major corporation the phone number usually stays with that person or the same person rather who is taking that person's transfer. So if the person in North Jersey went over to NY, which she did the phone number would still remain the same for that particular department.

Seven years ago we lost all those computers and again another Board of Education, Administration and the faculty is losing out for 248 laptops. It happened in Ocean County and I have to go back and make sure it was Ocean, it could have been Ocean or Monmouth but there is 248 pieces of hardware that you could have put on a desk of 248 more children by buying software from Apple, I am sure that is the deal. Same thing with Microsoft, they would have given teachers their monitors, everything needed and you would not have had any discrepancies in some of the books you had to replace, kids with helmets, USSR still in some of the books and what I would like to know also is how many children, I looked in the yearbook for Collins, and they just came home today or yesterday or over the weekend. There is about 18-19 children in a class, I don't know if that is the average across all the schools, how many children are going to be in an average...what is the student base in each of the classes? If we take children from schools and move them, if you take three kids from each of the grades you will have 15 average with all the schools functioning in September. Are we bringing this down too low and where are they coming from? I know you don't know where they are coming from yet?

Mr. Houser: Let me answer your first question first regarding the computer issue. We would ask you to take that to the Public Representation Committee because we definitely would be interested in getting anything we could get as far as a grant or anything to help with computers, books, anything. The second thing, I am going to ask Brian or Dr. McMahon, Mr. Falkowski or Dr. McMahon to answer the questions regarding the number of children in the classes?

Dr. McMahon: Basically, the new school opening there is only one regular classroom teacher being hired. What's mostly happening is students are leaving with the teacher going with them. The reason is because we don't have rooms for music, art, occupational therapy, so the class size is really not getting lower, the class is moving with the teacher. There is only one fourth grade, maybe a first grade, one or two teachers hired.

Mr. Checcia: So can we say that with the kids moving, 15 children to a classroom?

Dr. McMahon: Oh no, much higher than that.

Mr. Checcia: 17?

Dr. McMahon: The class sizes will stay relatively the same size they are now, depends on the grade level.

Mr. Checcia: So, it will be 19 the way you will figure it out?

Dr. McMahon: I think we will look at that, I am sure the Committee is looking at that with redistricting.

Mr. Checcia: That is ok how you are going to redistrict, I just wanted to know because that is a nice size class 18-20 kids. I don't want to take it too low, like 10, then there is a social problem then. Kids don't adjust as nice as they do with 15 or 16 kids socially. The least amount of kids in the classroom is not as conducive to social life.

Mrs. Sarno: What we are doing with the redistricting depending on where we move the kids from what schools the numbers of kids in the classrooms go up and down.

Mr. Checcia: OK, just the average classroom will be either the same or a little less, that is all.

Mr. Sarno: It could be 24, 22 or 20 around there right now.

Mr. Checcia: That is going to bring our student population to about 3,200 with this move?

Mr. Falkowski: That is correct

Mr. Checcia: The following year is there a projection yet?

Mr. Falkowski: We are receiving about 100 students a year.

Mr. Checcia: About 100 a year, is that with attrition, graduations and things?

Mr. Falkowski: That is correct.

Mr. Checcia: OK, so 100 new students, not necessarily 100 new homes, but 100 new students with children coming in. OK.

Mr. Houser: Mrs. Lally?

Kim Lally, 42 Bowline Street: I missed the meeting, your last meeting, I was away, but I understand that Officer Mitchell was removed from the Hooked on Fishing, Not On Drugs program, but I see that you have it on your agenda to replace him. Could somebody tell me why he was taken out?

Mr. Houser: When we talked about the budget failing and we met as a Committee, the Shared Services Committee of both the Township and the Board, we went through items that were cost effective that we needed to change and this was one of the items we needed to look at because

basically it is costing the taxpayers almost \$20,000 for a program that is 2 hrs and 45 mins. long each day for four weeks, so it just did not make sense.

Ms. Lally: The Hooked on Fishing Program cost \$20,000?

Mrs. Houser: No, the cost of having a DARE Officer work two months in the summer because he is working on the Hooked on Fishing is costing taxpayers close to \$20,000. So, therefore, the Township recommended like other districts that the officers only work ten months and that they go out and work in the field and there was also some talk about vandalism going on in Barnegat and they felt him, especially being a Detective, that would be much more cost effective to the taxpayer and a betterment to the community and safety of Barnegat if the police officer was actually out working instead of teaching a class.

Mrs. Lally: OK, that is the reason.

Mr. Houser: That is the actual facts, that is actually what happened in the Committee, it was actually brought in from the Township Committee, they suggested it and they brought up other issues as far as police officers and training and things like that. We listened and to be honest with you when it came down to making the financial decisions that we needed to make as a Board and we will have to make in the future, based on the State recommendations and things, it just made fiscal sense to do that, to bring somebody else in to teach the class at \$25 an hour instead of paying close to \$300.

Ms. Lally: OK, when I walked in here this evening I barely was through the threshold and I was handed this piece of paper that I would like to read to you. It says, "It seems unusual for the BOE to have been invited at no cost to the Senior Prom, it also seems coincidental that they are asking for two cops which is standard from Barnegat to accompany the kids to Carriage House. A point of interest is the suggestion from Mike Mitchell. Would anyone want to wager that BHS' first senior program will be the Linda and Mike Mitchell Show? I think we should prevent this if we can any suggestions?" Do you have any feelings on something like this?

Mr. Houser: I have no idea what that is about other than I know as far as the senior prom goes all the Board Members were given invitations. I think I am the only one....

Ms. Lally: Oh, I have no issue with the Board going to the Prom.

Mr. Houser: I believe I put my name down but I am not attending, I am just going to go in for five minutes say hello to everybody, check it out and leave.

Ms. Lally: No, no, you are misunderstanding my point. The main part of this piece of paper here is really the second portion, "would anyone like to wager being the Linda and Mike Mitchell Show and that it should be prevented". I am sorry, but you should be aware of this because it was emailed to you by Mrs. Becker. Officer Mitchell has been with these students for fourteen years, fourteen years he has spent with these kids and if there has to be an officer at their Prom, who better than the officer that knows them best? No other officer in this town knows those children better than Officer Mitchell. No other teacher in this district knows them

better than Officer Mitchell. Most have them for one year, he goes through with them for many, many years and even after they graduate from the DARE program they still ask for Officer Mitchell. They still want to see Officer Mitchell and to think that we should prevent Officer Mitchell from going to the Prom, I just would like clarification. I would like to know what exactly does that mean. The first time I came up to this podium after I was off this Board I said it is time to move forward. Everything that happened before April 15 needs to be forgotten and let go and I really meant that because nothing will be done if you are constantly back-stabbing one another. It is impossible to move forward but when something like this is sent out, what does the Mike and Linda Mitchell Show mean? What does that exactly mean have they become Sonny and Cher all of a sudden?

Mr. Houser: Let me just answer a lot of your questions. First of all, if you are asking whether the email was sent to me as Board President or personally whatever the email was I think there are some confidentially issues and if you want to go through all my emails....

Ms. Lally: This was handed to me here in this building.

Mr. Houser: Let me just answer, if you are insinuating there are many different emails that I get, I am on the computer constantly for my job...

Ms. Lally: Yes, I know you are very busy.

Mr. Houser: ...and to be honest with you people send me things and you know what they are just filed. So, I have no idea what that was about, I don't know what the Mike and Linda show as all about, we were all invited to the Prom and I said I was the only one that I am aware of that even put in. I don't intend on going, but I have no idea and as far as I know there was a request to have Mr. Tatur and Mr. Mitchell go to work there and you know what I don't think any of the Board members had any issue with that whatsoever. So, I have no idea how that was circumvented, sent out, whatever the issue was. But to be honest with you...

Ms. Lally: It was handed out here.

Mr. Houser: Well, Kim, if I looked at every one of my emails that were negative or anything instead of putting them where they belong, because that belongs in the trash and that is exactly where I'd put it..

Ms. Lally: You are absolutely right it does belong in the trash and if that Detective is not at that Prom, it is a sin to punish the kids again by taking Officer Mitchell away from them.

Mr. Houser: My understanding is the Board concurred with that I did not hear anything about any issue with it.

Ms. Lally: OK, then it is all a nasty rumor, that is it. I wanted to give you the courtesy of bringing it to your attention, but you have clarified it is just a nasty rumor and he will be at the Prom that is all I care about.

Mr. Houser: Now, if anybody, Dr. McMahon or anybody up here knows anything different, please tell me because my understanding was he would be there.

Mr. Scully: From police experience the Board does not dictate who the police department sends to what jobs go on. If he does not show up that night you have to talk to Chief Drexler because it is Chief Drexler's job and the Union's position on who works that position.

Ms. Lally: I understand, absolutely.

Mr. Scully: But as far as the Board deciding he is not going to work that, that is not our decision, it is the police department's decision.

Ms. Lally: You are absolutely right, it shouldn't be. My concern was this, when I am handed this piece of paper when I walk in here, first I find out and you explained it, that he was removed from Hooked on Fishing and then I see that somebody is being replaced. I can understand if the program was being taken away altogether, but you are just replacing him and putting somebody else there.

Mr. Scully: Can I just finish real quick then? Mr. Tatur and Mr. Mitchell would be the perfect fit...

Ms. Lally: Let me finish.

Mr. Scully: Let me finish, you asked a question, can I finish?

Ms. Lally: I didn't ask you anything, I didn't, I am sorry, I didn't.

Mr. Scully: Mr. Houser asked me to explain it to you.

Ms. Lally: OK, I know that you don't pick them, I understand that and I agree with that you should not pick them, but I want to make sure he is not being disqualified.

Mr. Scully: If you just heard what I said he is not being disqualified because we do not have the right to disqualify him because the Union will make a grievance on that and it is up to the police department and who works the job.

Ms. Lally: How many times have I sat up there and had people accuse us of things that we fully know that it was not our decision. So, really, in theory, that is pretty. My issue is as long as he is not being disqualified from the Prom and if this email is a hoax and Mrs. Becker did not say that we should prevent this and call it the Mike Mitchell Show and that is not true, that is fine, I am satisfied.

Mr. Davis: Mr. Houser, can I comment for a second?

Mr. Houser: Sure

Mr. Davis: Mrs. Lally, I know for a fact that Mr. Mitchell was asked to attend the Prom and to work it and he turned it down, even though it was overtime, he turned it down.

Ms. Lally: OK, I just didn't want to see him get the shaft.

Mr. Houser: Thank you Dereck, because I was not aware of that I thought he was going to work it.

Mr. Davis: I am aware of the email thing she is talking about too, I know somebody who received it. She commented earlier about the salary and what it was costing the district for Mike Mitchell to teach the Hooked on Fishing so I am really curious to see those numbers in writing why it would cost us so much for that, the \$20,000.

Mr. Houser: OK, we will do that. Anybody else from the public?

Tom Kostka, 36 Anchor Road: I just listened to Kim talk about this email. Let me just ask Mrs. Becker, did you write this email?

Mrs. Becker: No.

Mr. Kostka: This email did not come from you?

Mrs. Becker: It came through my email account, yes, but it was a forward where I removed the header from the person it came from and sent it for information.

Mr. Kostka: Well, thank you for that, see plain and simple it wasn't from her, thanks.

Mr. Houser: Anyone else?

Voice: I just want to make a quick comment if I may, Mr. President. About the Hooked on Fishing, you had said it was costing us \$20,000, the Township \$20,000, but that was not for the Hooked on Fishing Program, correct, that was for using him as a DARE officer, him as the officer role was costing \$20,000. Hooked on Fishing wasn't costing \$20,000, right?

Mr. Houser: But that is the only role there is in the summer, so it is actually costing us for Hooked on Fishing. Do we have a Motion to close Public Comment?

For services rendered in connection with a capital lease, including drafting of necessary documents such as the ground lease, the lease, the assignment, the trust indenture and the necessary resolutions, the applications to the Commissioner of education and to the Local Finance Board, review of the disclosure document, attendance at meetings to discuss the financing and the documents, preparation of the closing documents and attendance at the closing, \$15,000.00, plus \$1.00 per thousand dollars of securities issued. In the event that the transaction cannot be completed, the fee to be charged shall be a reasonable one, based on the services performed.

E. The following services will be rendered at an hourly rate of \$185.00 for attorney time and \$100.00 for paralegal time. Arbitrage compliance and related tax analysis, services involving disclosure and official statement work in connection with the issuance of obligations, attendance at meetings, attention to any litigation that may occur, construction contract drafting or negotiations, applications to State agencies, including the State department of Education, the Local Finance Board, the economic Development Agency or other agencies, review of documents and rendering of legal opinions required in connection with the issuance of a credit support such as bond insurance or letter of credit, applications to the Federal Reserve Bank for investments of proceeds of obligations in State and Local Government Series Obligations and unique research and analysis services rendered beyond the scope of the services described in this agreement.

F. In the event of an advance refunding bond issue providing for an escrow agreement and an investment of the proceeds consistent with the restrictions of the Internal Revenue Code to provide for the payment of a prior issue of bonds, there will be a fee of \$7,500.00 in addition to the fees described herein.

G. In the event that a bond sale is held but all bids are rejected or the sale is canceled, or this agreement is terminated prior to the sale of the bonds, the fee to be charged shall be a reasonable one, based on the services performed.

H. Customary disbursements for postage, telephone, document production and reproduction, travel and out-of-pocket expenses shall be added to the fees referred to in this Agreement.

5. Motion to Approve Students Completing Field Experiences Throughout the 2008-2009 School Year

Motion to approve students completing field experiences throughout the 2008-2009 school year. The Board of Education encourages cooperation with colleges

and universities in the training of student teachers. Within the boundaries of the standard agreements with various institutions of higher learning, the district will continue to accept students completing field experience throughout the school year.

6. Motion to Approve Participation in the Ocean County School-Based Mentoring Program for the 2008-2009 School Year

Motion to approve participation in the Ocean County school-based mentoring program for the 2008-2009 school year. The program is designed to provide mentoring services to children, ages 7-14, who have been referred by a teacher, school counselor, parent, or administrator. Mentors are adult community volunteers who are thoroughly interviewed, screened, and trained by the county school-based mentoring coordinator. Some of the topics that are emphasized in the mentors' training include the development of effective listening skills, an appreciation of diversity, and understanding the challenges facing today's children. To ensure safety, a complete criminal background check is also required for all volunteers in the program.

One of the main goals of the program is to increase a child's self-confidence by providing positive experiences from caring and non-judgmental adults. Game playing, reading, solving puzzles, and sharing stories are a few of the activities that mentors and students can enjoy.

The school counselor will serve as liaison to the county coordinator and will arrange for a convenient day, time, and place for the mentors and students to meet. Most meetings will be held in the school library and will run from late September to early June. The school counselor and administrators reserve the right to have the final say on all mentor volunteers. The program will be piloted at the Collins Schools and will include 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students, exclusively. The program is completely free to our district.

7. Motion to Approve Mentor-Novice Teacher Program for 2008-2009 SY

Motion to approve the Mentor-Novice Teacher (Mentee) program for the 2008-2009 school year.
