I. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Melchiondo: I would like to open the meeting with the Barnegat Board of Education and the Barnegat Township Committee for May 12, 2010 provisions of the Open Public Meeting law.

Committeeman Ryan: I just want to take a few minutes to explain that I must leave. I have another appointment and I need to be down at St. Mary's Church for the 7:00 p.m. mass. I apologize for having to leave; however, I did want to talk for just a few seconds about how wonderful it is when people work together. That is what has happened since the voters turned down this budget. The Board of Education and the Township Committee have been meeting and everything has gone very smoothly. It is an example of what can be accomplished and you will hear more about that as this meeting goes on. I did want to make that statement. Tonight our Township Committee will be looking at Resolution 2010-231 and I just wanted to express my approval and I wanted it in the record that I do approve this and I do vote yes for it. IV. **FLAG SALUTE**

Mayor Melchiondo: Can everyone rise to salute the Flag, please?

Mayor Melchiondo: At this time I just want to make a brief statement about what all of us have been through over the last couple of weeks and I can tell you this that failed school budgets are not a whole lot of fun. We have all had to spend a lot of hours on this. I can attest to it myself and the rest of the Committee, school board members and the administrators involved in what we had to do. It was a long, drawn-out process for us over the last couple of weeks. As I said, in the past we all wanted to make sure that the number one thing we kept in mind was the education of the children of Barnegat Township and I think you will find tonight that the end result is just that. Let me basically explain it this way. We had given a dollar amount to the school board which we thought would be the reduction in the budget and quite frankly they came very close to that number within a few thousand dollars and I think we were all quite pleased that they were able to do that and by doing that they had enumerated a number of departments that would be affected by reductions. Those being, I don't know if you have that on your agenda out there, but number one being transportation, security, minimal things happening in sports, administrative staff, playground and cafeteria aides, nurses and also some after school activities and a couple of other things like reducing water utility costs.

The end result was \$812,710 in reductions to the budget were made but there was one factor that I don't think any of us on the Committee had given a whole lot of thought to and that was that when there is a reduction in staff that could possibly go out on

unemployment, the school is mandated to increase their reserve for unemployment taxes. With that said that amount is \$205,461 which leaves a net budget reduction of \$607,249. Again, that was one of the numbers we really did not factor into our thought process from the Committee level and when we were presented with that it was something we could absorb and understand and that was just one of those things that we had no control over and neither did the Board of Education. We did not consider the fact that they were reducing the budget by a lesser amount, I believe by the \$812,000 they did come up with was more than fair and we all basically agreed on that. With that we are going into an open public portion for anyone who would like to comment on what I have said so far or who might have some other comments on the school budget. With that I would like to ask for a motion to open to the public.

Mr. Adorno: Madam President, do we have an opportunity to make a comment before we open up to the public for budget?

Mrs. Becker: Yes

Mayor Melchiondo: No objection

Mr. Adorno: I would like to take the opportunity also to make a few comments in regard to the school budget. Some of the concerns that I have, obviously, there were quotes in the paper in regard to that we will do what is right. The Township had stated and the Mayor himself, we have had a great relationship working together, but he made comments in regard to that they will not hurt the children and their education and as well what was a reasonable thing for the tax rate of the town. We are all entitled to our opinions. The theme of the night of the last meeting was not to touch the budget, it was a very lean budget and I do have my right to an opinion and I felt that they have hurt us. They have hurt us about \$350,000 too much. When I took the numbers out and I looked at it I feel it does not really go to theme of not hurting the children. It has affected us in some way and I feel that is something I wanted to state out there. I just hope that some of my concerns, in three years there has been \$1.3M or more taken from our schools from two defeated budgets in three years. One thing I can say is that I do not see \$1.3M increase in anything for the Township end-wise. So, I hope in July that when the Township budget is actually put forward that they really make a lean budget with enough cuts that represent also the taxpayer as well. Thank you.

Mrs. Becker: Is there anyone else who would like to make a comment before we open to public?

VII. PUBLIC HEARING

Mayor Melchiondo: Ok, I think what we can do here now is anyone who would like to speak should come down to the podium and maybe line up behind each other if that is convenient because it is sometimes hard to see who has hands raised. Yes, sir? Please state your name and address for the record, thank you.

Name inaudible: I spoke at the last meeting and I took the challenge to look at the budget and I read all through about 900 or so line items. One of the things in there that concerns me is that it is not really implied in any of the official statements or the power point in there that this includes 4.25% raise for the majority of the staff. Just looking at numbers and doing a sample of these upcoming vs. the present numbers. We are quite aware of the economic situation that is facing our country and our township. You can listen to the radio and hear that general taxes are down because people's incomes are down. I do respect the role that educators play, but I do not respect that a 4.25% raise either by union contract or other type of contract is consistent with what the average Barnegat citizen is seeing. So, the comments from Mr. Adorno I would like to echo and say that when you apply that to the aggregate of line items tracing each of these expenditures there are some savings opportunities there that is not off-kilter or not inconsistent with what the average citizen is having to take. So, I would ask that be looked at.

Mayor Melchiondo had mentioned that he looked at a saving there and the appendix was provided by the way, and thank you for putting the numbers out there, but when you mentioned that you did not account for the unemployment insurance to the tune of about a \$250M delta there, that tells me that perhaps there needs to be a procedure or ordinance along those lines that allows us to make these things right the first time so the technical rigor is there. I think when we do that and we are able to forecast and apply a repeatable method to this that in the long term we will see some fiscal restraint and we will see some lessons learned from the township point of view which I am sure can be applied later this year as was also mentioned. With that I close my comments.

Mayor Melchiondo: Thank you sir.

Mrs. Becker: On those two points just so you are clear. There are no contracts that are in valid operation at this time that have 4.25% so I am not sure what you are looking at. The BA contract is 3.75%, the administrators' contract is 3% and Jason, the senior administrators is 2.75% correct?

Mr. Bing: I believe so.

Mrs. Becker: Also, the unemployment issue, the budget committee did and was always aware of the unemployment impact. It was through our discussions with the town that they were not aware that we had to calculate. Mr. Houser, what was it, one salary for every two?

Mr. Bing: Three

Mrs. Becker: We had worked on that just so you know.

Mayor Melchiondo: Also I would like to comment on that point too, unemployment. and being in business for myself for a number of years. That is a figure that is never a certainty. Just because they put an additional \$205,000 into that account that does not mean it will be exactly what they have to spend. It could be more and it could be less, it

depends on their experience rating from the year before and who is actually out of work and collecting unemployment and who is actually out of work for a short time and goes to work somewhere else and is not collecting anymore. That is one of those figures that is put in a reserve for the rainy day that might come down the road.

Mr. Rich Rizinsky, 1094 West Bay Ave.: Are you telling me that you are going to pass the school budget as it stands now?

Mrs. Becker: The school budget as amended with this Resolution with the reductions.

Mayor Melchiondo: The school budget will be voted on this evening with the net reductions of \$607,000 this evening.

Mr. Rich Rizinsky: Didn't the people of Barnegat vote it down?

Mayor Melchiondo: Yes and that is why we are here. This is the process.

Mr. Rich Rizinsky: So you are going to reinstate the school budget.

Mayor Melchiondo: We are not reinstating, we are voting on the budget as amended this evening. This is the procedure that is done and allowed by law and required by law. For example, should we come to an impasse with the school board and we could not decide how to amend the budget, then it would have to go further up. What I don't think you realize is there is over \$2M actually cut out of this budget between what the school board did to get the budget on the agenda to be voted on and where we are tonight, over a total of \$2.1M in reduction.

Mr. Rizinsky: I think that is too fat. It is too fat of a budget that the school board has right now. I think we should stick with the vote that the people of Barnegat voted to knock it down. I believe wholeheartedly we should have charter schools in Barnegat like starting next contract because the charter schools give just as good an education as the teachers in Barnegat. We won't have to pay for their pension, we won't have to pay for their health benefits or sick days, we won't have to pay for anything. Let some outside concern do it. We did with the garbage, we went with Waste Management and we knocked off all the people in Barnegat, we should go with a public charter school and that is the way I feel. I think the Board should consider knocking off at least \$10M more off this because the seniors in this town what they are going to do will do the protest on the taxes and then a cap of 2.5% and the teachers will not get anything, they will be lucky to have a job.

Mrs. Sarno: You are asking us to close three schools then and cram all the kids into the remaining three schools, that is what you are asking.

Mr. Rizinsky: You are telling me they would close three schools?

Mrs. Sarno: It takes just over \$2M to run a school so if you want us to cut.

Mr. Rizinsky: Can we open one of these schools with a charter school?

Mrs. Sarno: I am saying if we were to cut another \$10M you are talking that we would completely lose any activity or sports which means your taxes would still go up because we would have to hire more police officers for our streets.

Mr. Rizinsky: We have tax appeal.

Mrs. Sarno: And we would have to close numerous schools if we were to do that.

Mr. Rizinsky: Get charter schools and all the teachers that got laid off, rehire them.

Mayor Melchiondo: The Deputy Mayor would like to give an idea that ultimately may be the answer to all of this if we could all seem to get together within the State of New Jersey because I am on board with it, but I will let Al Cirulli tell you about it.

Deputy Mayor Cirulli: There is something we have been stating for the last three years; unless the way schools are funded is changed the burden will always fall on the property owners. We are only one, out of four of the fifty states, that fund it the way we do on property taxes. Your taxes will never go down regardless if it is a charter school or regular school because you will have to pay for the charter school too. We have to change this. Everybody should get on the phone tomorrow and call the state legislators and demand that they change the way schools are funded otherwise we will be back here every year to make as many cuts as we can until we finally come to a point where there will not be able to do any more cuts, there will not be any salary increases, but you will have energy costs and so forth. That is the only way we will be able to resolve this and have a better handle on this.

Mr. Rizinsky: Are the teachers going to take a wage freeze for one year?

Mrs. Taylor: The teachers were not given an opportunity to vote to take a wage freeze, so no at this point they are not because their union president and their executive board decided not to take a vote for them to take a wage freeze.

Mr. Rizinsky: So they are not going to take a wage freeze.

Mrs. Taylor: No

Mr. Rizinsky: So they are not going to give the township and the people of this township a break. There is only so much you can beat the dog before it dies. I am telling you the people have to wake up and come into the real world because the people of Barnegat are not going to be paying these outrageous taxes any more. Does anybody know the percent of money that actually goes to the children of the school district?

Mrs. Becker: Are you talking about out of the tax dollar?

Mrs. Sarno: What goes back to the classroom?

Mr. Houser: 59% goes to education

Mr. Rizinsky: Not the teachers.

Mrs. Sarno: Without the teachers you have no education.

Mr. Rizinsky: What about school supplies?

Mrs. Sarno: We can't have children teaching children, we need teachers to teach children. Teachers are a part of the educational process.

Mr. Rizinsky: I believe the teachers should take any where between a 5-8% cut in their pay and freeze it for at least two years so the citizens of Barnegat can get their breath. This township is on the brink of disaster as the state is.

Mr. Jones: Sir, your time is up, sir.

Mr. Rizinsky: Thank you.

Kim Hockran, 3 Tulip Court: I would like to ask a question about these cuts. I would like to know exactly what after-school activities are being cut at the Brackman School, the 40% reduction.

Mr. Bing: That will be up to our principals. At this point we cut a percentage and those decisions will be made one month from now.

Ms. Hockran: We don't know which assistant coaches?

Mr. Bing: There were further cuts and we do not know yet, they will be determined later as an administrative group.

Ms. Hockran: The \$607,000 we saved is lowering the tax rate by what?

Mrs. Becker: Roughly .02.

Ms. Hockran: I will give you back my .02 and we will keep all the after-school activities so the kids have somewhere to go and something to do after school. I would just like to say as a citizen of Barnegat that I do not feel that our teachers should take any cuts. I do not feel this budget was fat. I think our teachers and our school system do a great job and that is why so many people are trying to move to Barnegat. There are new houses being built every single day and maybe if they would look at the zoning laws and redistricting of the town a little bit better we would not be in such a horrible situation we are in right now with no schools west of the parkway with more new single family developments

going in and those are just more kids that will be coming into the school system. The reason people want to come here is because we do have a good school system. I am very sorry that you cut anything at all. I was here at the last meeting with the Township Committee and there was not one citizen in this room that voted against this budget. The budget did not lose by a huge margin, it lost by 200-300 votes tops.

Mr. Allison: 186.

Ms. Hockran: 186, there you go. I don't feel that is a mandate by any stretch of the imagination. I am very sorry that the township gave you a number to cut and that you had to go back and look at anything at all. I do think that this is going to have an impact on the children of this town and I think it is a shame.

Len Morano, 34 Highland Drive: Citizen and taxpayer at the moment. I just want to comment on that gentleman who came here. First of all you do not come here and accuse teachers, because teachers are the backbone of what is going on here in Barnegat. I work with them and I know these people and I don't care what anybody says, we have the best in the state of New Jersey. The staff and support staff is the best and they deserve the best because they are bringing children to the level of the 21st century in this district in Barnegat. You can go anywhere in New Jersey and say you live in Barnegat and the first thing they say is you have a great education system in Barnegat and you guys up there are going to keep it great. It is because of our staff and our support staff.

The other thing I do have to say, young lady, why we cut the budget, it is a necessity. If we did not cut the budget could you afford a .25 tax increase on a dollar of your house? If your house is \$300,000 you would go up \$1,100-\$1,200 tax increase. There would be more empty houses than we have now. We all are sitting up here as people and elected officials, we have two things to do, represent the people and represent the township. We have to do what we feel is the best for the people and for the taxpayers. That is who we represent, you the taxpayer. We want suggestions, we want to know what we should do but in our heart we have to do what we know is right. Thank you.

Catherine Novak, 80 Bowline St: I am a widow, unemployed presently and trying to live on social security and a very small pension. We cannot afford a tax increase. You must do something and also I would like to know why Manahawkin can come in at \$3M under what Barnegat comes under. Thank you.

Mrs. Becker: On your Manahawkin reference, Manahawkin has two different school districts. One is the regional school which is a middle and high school and the other is the elementary. They run two separate budgets and obviously we are K-12 so we a whole different group of expenditures lumped into one where they separate them out. I don't think anybody here wanted to present a budget that had any tax increase. For three years this Board of Education has presented a budget to the public that was \$1M or more less than the year before. That is something that most districts can't say. The budget that came out to the voters this year was already cut \$2.5M before it went to the public and failed. It was an absorption of all the increased costs and the salaries and benefits. This

additional cut which our responsibility as board members is to try and sustain a thorough and efficient education and to work for the welfare of the students in the district, the township committee represents the taxpayers, we worked to find that mutual ground. We have to thank our administrators for sharpening their pencils; everybody we went back to assured us that they can still give the kids everything they are used to and everything that people who move to Barnegat to give their kids in this budget. We will work to improve things over the next year and hopefully next year we will not get hit with a \$3.4M cut that no one could have prepared for. There was no alternative but to go to the taxpayer. We were given no tools or no alternative revenue to recover from. So as much as we understand and we really have tried to hold the line on taxes there was no alternative; the appeals were done, the revenue stream was down. So, unfortunately, even with the best budget team that I could ever have looked at, the input from all the board members that are up here, the township committee who has the insight of having a member of their committee an educator, this really is a responsible reduction that won't impact the kids and we hope we won't have to do this ever again. We really don't. Mr. Cirulli is right, we need to find an alternate revenue stream for education, otherwise this is going to be situation year after year.

Mrs. Sarno; Also, the other difference between Manahawkin and Barnegat is that Manahawkin has a lot more ratables than we do and when you live in Barnegat, a lot of the Barnegat residents have said they like Barnegat the way it is and they don't want to bring in all these huge ratables. They do not want our town with Wal-Mart and Pathmark. We like our little area and we chose not to have all those ratables and then our taxes will go up.

Ms. Novak: Well as you know, social security did not go up this year so why should the teachers get a raise automatically. It does not seem fair. I would like you all to come to Bowline Street. Right in my block we have three abandoned houses in a small area; this is what is happening to our town. We are getting slaughtered.

Mayor Melchiondo: Anyone else like to speak?

Scott Sarno, 7 Herkimer Court: I have a lot of things after hearing all this talk. First, I don't know if there is law or state mandate as far as social workers and counselors in a school district. I know last night I was at the Brackman School for orientation for sixth graders and my wife and I spoke to one of the counselors there. I don't want to say who, but I asked what does a counselor do and basically the answer was not many kids come down here, the office is always empty. I help, I fill in the art area or music or here and there. I kind of act as a guidance counselor too. There is not much difference between a social worker and guidance counselor. I don't know if there are state requirements or how many you have to have per student/school, but I don't know how many you have in the district. Obviously, he did not know who he was talking to that he can say he really does nothing all day as far as counseling and that no kids really come and see him, it is a problem. I don't know what they get paid but that is a problem.

Going on from that, it is good to see the administrators here today to support the budget and the board on what is going on in the district. I am glad to see them here, I have brought up the point that I think they should be at all meetings like in the past because when parents come here to ask questions they take time out of their lives and busy schedules to ask questions and they don't like to here I will have to get with the principal of the school on that or the head of Transportation or Security to find out and I'll get back to you. I used to here a lot of that two years ago, I'll get back to you, I'll get back to you. That was one of the reasons why I always thought they should be here so you could go right to the source and tell the parent while they are here what they need to know. That is just my own pet peeve.

The other thing, Mr. Adorno I agree with you on the issue of the budget. The town should take a good look at itself. The people do not get to vote on your budget every year, we get to vote on you and I know in the last year from this Board has cut taxes by .05; .02 one year and .03 the other year. The township turn right back around and raised the people's taxes .02 the one year and .03 the next year. So, you should also look in the mirror when you are taking these people to task and cutting the budget. I think it is a shame that you don't know, I mean I know, that when you cut a job you also have to pay for the unemployment of that person. You did not know until after the fact which is amazing as elected officials.

Another issue is, I know one of the parents got up here, but the parents have nobody to blame but themselves when it comes to this budget failing. I was out there, Mr. Cloke was out there, Mr. Mihalik was out there, my wife was out there and Mr. Houser was there beating the pavement for one and one-half months, talking to people, seniors and parents, knocking on doors and handing flyers out to support the budget and telling people what we could about the positive things going on. I can tell you on my own street, because I check every year, I know we got the thing this year on who voted last year, and on my street of 30 houses, five parents came out and voted which includes my wife and me. So, three other people on my street came out and voted. In the senior area, the seniors come out and vote. If you want to look at why the budget did not pass, I bet about 7% of the parents came out to vote and about 18% of the seniors came out so that is why your budget failed. I did see the teachers came out the one weekend handing out flyers in support of the budget but a little late on doing that.

My last thing I would like to touch on is about the teachers not having a vote on taking a salary freeze. I worked with the leadership of the teachers three years ago when I was on the board, I was the head of the negotiations and I know Lou and Roz and the whole team. I think it is a disservice they did to our children, to the people within their union that they would not allow a vote for their own personal reasons and I think this board should remember that in July, 2011 when that contract expires. Just my own personal thing, they should at least have the guts to show up at these last two meetings and face the public and listen to the criticism. I don't see them here and I did not see them at the last meeting, and I guess the members can pass it on to them if they want to address me, I will address them. I think it is cowardly not to show up and face the fire.

Mayor Melchiondo: Anyone else? If you want to comment again, we will hold you to a minutes sir, come on down.

Name Not Given: I would like to revise and extend my remarks. The clarification in this case is this and with respect to the unemployment piece as well. My only point is that we are learning here there needs to be a process and a template of what we need to spend and we need to have something that shows us where things are changing. We need something that shows us when Trenton-based changes are coming and where population-based changes are coming, average income, average age and projections. I know some of that is built in but I think that we would have had a better outcome sooner on this and a lot more public understanding along time ago if we had a presentation or a means of understanding where the changes are. It is not about standing up here and getting a multi-million dollar number and then when somebody says I don't like your number, where are you going to cut? Cut, cut, cut is not the answer. It is optimizing our resources, finding different solutions, maybe getting some working groups together and finding a real solution and not just we have to get the scissors out and hope it passes this time.

Mayor Melchiondo: Anyone else?

Mr. Allison: I just want to say, and I am new, I have only been in this district one and one-half years but I have over 30 years in management experience in the corporate world in fairly significant levels. I will tell you that the process here is highly refined for developing the budget. The Board and myself and the superintendent have been meeting practically on a weekly basis since early in January and it became very intense in March. In terms of knowing what to expect, we got our state aid numbers...we had been notified to anticipate potentially a loss of \$1.5M of state aid. On a Thursday afternoon at 4:30 p.m. we found out that we found out that we lost over \$3.1M and we had about 72 hours to re-do that budget and get it into the county which was due on the following Monday. From Thursday night we worked through the weekend in order to get that done. I will also tell you in terms of the process with this committee, I think you are well represented in Barnegat by both your board of education and your Township Committee. I have been in four school districts and I have never had so much respect for all of the members and the Township Committee in terms of their commitment to both the taxpayer and the students in the community. Lastly, I would like to comment and I am not going to disparage the Governor because I voted for him, but I am telling you he made several campaign promises, one of which was to fund fairly the schools in this state. He has not kept that promise and I am here to tell you that over 50% of the state budget still goes to about 31 districts with less than 20% of the students in the state. Why is that? The Supreme Court. Secondly, he made a campaign promise that he would do away with the so-called millionaires' tax. He kept that promise that cost him almost \$1B in revenue and that is what he took from the schools.

Mayor Melchiondo: Karen?

Karen McKeon, District Supervisor for Curriculum/Instruction: I just want to commend everyone; I know it was a very daunting task for everyone to have to lay people off. I know nobody was aware that the economic conditions were going to be so dire and to reiterate what Dean just said, we start off with a zero balance budget. We identify the textbooks needed for the students, the programs that are needed, what is needed for each child in the district, that is the last thing we consider cutting. Everyone here and on the stage worked together to try and create a budget that was best for the students. Again, thank you very much. I know that does not help people in the audience, but I do know that everyone worked very, very hard to get to the point to address the needs of our students here in Barnegat. I have been here for 30 years so I know that the kids here are well taken care of and unfortunately the Governor did throw a couple of curve balls to us and that is why scenario 1, 2 and 3 of the budget had to be created in a matter of seconds. Thank you.

Sarah Winchester, 22 Portland Street: My question might be confusion on my part but I think you just said we had \$3.1M cut out of the budget. If I am not mistaken at one of the meetings I was at we saved \$1.1M which was the 41 positions, correct? Then when it was defeated we needed to do \$2.1M but now we are really only cutting only \$607,000. Is that right? What is the impact on the taxpayer with this?

Mayor Melchiondo: You want to know what the impact is on the tax rate after the final budget would be adopted.

Ms. Winchester: I think we would have almost \$1.5 left.

Mr. Breeden: The current school tax rate is 91.9 cents and if the school budget proposed tonight with the amendments is adopted the new school tax rate will be \$1.00 even.

Ms. Winchester: So it went up 8.1%. Thank you.

**RESOLUTION OF THE BARNEGAT BOARD OF EDUCATION CONCERNING
THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE’S REVIEW OF THE ANNUAL SCHOOL
BUDGET FOR THE 2010-2011 SCHOOL YEAR**

WHEREAS, on April 20, 2010, the annual school budget for the academic year 2010-2011, as prepared by the Barnegat Township Board of Education (hereinafter referred to as “Board”), was submitted to the voters of the Township and was defeated; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 18A:22-37, the General Fund Budget for the year 2010-2011 has been presented to the Township Committee (hereinafter referred to as “Committee”) for its determination of the amount necessary to be appropriated for each item appearing in the General Fund budget; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey State Statute requires the Committee to certify the amount of local tax revenue to support a thorough and efficient system of education where a tax levy referendum of the Board is defeated by the voters of a municipality; and

WHEREAS, in the course of reviewing the defeated school budget, the Committee and the representatives of the Board, conducted a series of joint meetings; and

WHEREAS, the Board and the Committee in consultation with each other and with their own respective administrations, have reached an agreement to reduce the general tax levy for the 2010-2011 school year, the sum of six hundred seven thousand, two hundred and forty nine (\$607,249.00) dollars, to be taken from certain appropriations as listed herein; and

WHEREAS, the Board’s review of such reduction in appropriations will not prevent a thorough and efficient education and will maintain the stability of the school district given the need for long-term planning and budgeting.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED on this 12th day of May, 2010, by the Barnegat Township Board of Education, County of Ocean, State of New Jersey as follows:

1. The Board hereby adjusts its budgetary expenses for the items appearing on the attached

Schedule "A" pursuant to New Jersey Statutes for the 2010-2011 fiscal year.

2. The reduced tax levy to be certified of twenty six million, three hundred seventy nine thousand, six hundred eighty seven (\$26,379,687.00) dollars is sufficient to provide a thorough and efficient education and provide for the stability of the Barnegat Township School District.
